The School seeks to provide a wide range of opportunities for pupils of all ages and interests to take responsibility, work as part of a team, face new challenges, acquire new skills, and develop physically and creatively.

The School will ensure equal opportunities for all students and in those activities requiring selection will ensure a fair and unbiased process.

All students are encouraged to participate in at least one extra-curricular activity and should seek to challenge themselves in new environments and aspire to achieve their full potential

Student commitment to the co-curricular and extra-curricular programme will be monitored and evaluated and the positive outcomes will be recognised and rewarded.

Staff members are expected to make a valid contribution to the co-curricular and extra-curricular programme.

The extra-curricular will be line managed by a designated member of the SMT and evaluation will take place in coordination with the line manager and the HoD where appropriate.

Suggestions and proposals for starting new activities should be addressed to the designated SMT member. Such proposals will be given consideration on a wide number of points and issues before the establishment of new clubs.

The School will seek to promote this policy through an active partnership with parents, outside organisations and other stakeholders. The underlying ethos of enhancing the school experience will be maintained at all times. Dear Parents and Students,

It gives me great pleasure to share the extra-curricular activities programme for the academic year 2021 – 2022. Together with the management team, the Activities Committee, and our dedicated teachers, we have put together an enriching programme of activities for the benefit of our students.

Action Requires physical exertion contributing to a healthy lifestyle to complement the demands of academic work, such as sports or dance classes.

An unpaid and voluntary exchange that has learning benefit for the student. The rights, dignity, and autonomy of all those involved are respected. This can include charity work, service to the school, environmental volunteering (ECO schools) and campaigning for causes.

The benefits of ECA are many, ranging from increased engagement and attainment at school to social benefits and self-confidence. It's the beginning of a long journey of wellbeing, mindful contribution and active citizenship which will last a lifetime, regardless of career choice.

Here are a few points to help you.


- Read through the booklet carefully, and discuss your choices with your parents, teachers and friends.

- If activities are at the same time, you will need to choose. Speak to the teachers involved to help make your decision.



EYP (European Youth Parliament)

Years 4 - 5

The European Youth Parliament is a peer-to-peer educational programme that inspires and empowers young people from across Europe to be open-minded, tolerant and active citizens. We provide participants with a forum to develop and express their opinions on a wide range of topics. By bringing young people from different backgrounds together, we build intercultural understanding and friendships across borders. EYP participants and volunteers get equipped with the knowledge and the skills needed to positively shape the world around them. Thousands of young people are actively involved as volunteers all over Europe, making the EYP a genuinely youth-driven programme - run by young people, for young people.

MEDIMUN (Mediterranean Model United Nations)

Years 5 - 6

MEDIMUN is a debating activity where students take on the role of diplomats from a country. They prepare resolutions on topics of current interest for the annual conference in February. At the conference students are welcomed from across Cyprus and the conference is run by students from The English School. Weekly meetings are held to train students. Students are selected through competitive interview. This year delegates will be from Year 5 and 6 only.

MUN (Model United Nations)

Years 5 - 7

The Model United Nations is a club which has been running for a number of years and which has achieved a great deal of popularity among students from years 5-7. The MUN is a simulation of the real United Nations where every school is assigned a country to represent. Members of the school's delegation act as delegates of that country through lobbying, writing resolutions, learning about the United Nations and becoming well - versed in parliamentary procedure. After extensive preparation students attend a one week conference which is held in The Hague, The Netherlands during the last week in January every year. Students are selected after an interview process, as the programme has become highly competitive, meetings are held every Thursday between 1.45pm - 3.00pm and attendance is mandatory.

Erasmus+

Year 2

The values of Erasmus are: unity in diversity, diversity in unity, students helping students, fun in friendship and respect, the international dimension of life, love for Europe as an area of peace and cultural exchange, openness with tolerance and cooperation in integration.

During weekly meetings, Year 2 students from The English School will collaborate with students from our 5 partner schools (Germany, Portugal, Poland, Italy, Finland) to explore the topic 'Food for Thought'. The project will involve various activities at the school as well as in the different partner countries. Students are encouraged to embrace the values of Erasmus and should be interested in travelling to other countries, be willing to be hosted by local families and to host in return.

Debate Society (Senior)

Years 4 - 7

The Debating Society at the English School has over the last 25 years or so made huge strides in promoting public speaking as a serious discipline both at the School and in Cyprus. We have taken part in the International Independent Schools Public Speaking Tournament since 1991 (normally held in Canada and the USA), winning categories in Persuasive Speaking, After-dinner Speaking, Extemporaneous Speaking, Impromptu, and Dramatic Interpretation. We have also been firm supporters of the World Individual Debating and Public Speaking Championship, travelling to the UK, USA, Argentina, South Africa, Hong Kong and Australia. The English School is a founder member of this competition and hosted in 1995, 2000 and 2005 with great success. Last year the competition was held in Toronto, Canada and 6 students represented the English School, and Cyprus. Further details can be found at WIDPSC.com. Years 4 to 7 participate in competitions in Debating held over the Autumn and Spring Terms. Finals take place in February to determine which students will represent the school in international competition.

Junior Debate Society

The Junior Debate Club helps you develop your oral communication and listening skills in English and also gives you the ability to critically evaluate the world around you. There are lots of exciting, relevant topics to be discussed following formal debate techniques.

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At the Greek Debate Club we accept enthusiastic lower school students who would like to voice their opinion on controversial and contentious issues, as well as to improve their debating skills and learn more about the art of speech. Raising awareness on several crucial national and international matters can be an important aspect of pupils' development, as it helps them expand their knowledge and their capacity to apply their critical thinking skills on a wide array of subjects. In this way a student is encouraged to think broadly, which is a defining characteristic of a global citizen.

Greek Creative Writing

Years 1 - 3

Creative writing can technically be considered any original composition of any type of writing which serves primarily the need for keeping records of significant experience, the need for sharing experience with an interested group, and the need for free individual expression which contributes to mental and physical health. The aim of the Creative Writing Club is to allow the students to express their emotions and to help them to strengthen their skills and writing techniques. Creative writing is usually taught in a workshop and students submit original work for peer critique. Students also format a writing method through the process of writing and re-writing and they are given the opportunity to come in contact with the work of distinguished writers through a more creative way. The Creative Writing Club started 10 years ago and it runs its own blog spot "Grafouccino." Which you can follow at: http://grafouccino.blogspot.com. This year's aim is to participate in competitions, to attend workshops by experts, to meet with authors and to celebrate the international day of poetry in March.

Greek Poetry

Economics Society

Year 4 - 5, 6 - 7

The Economics Society Committee, which is elected annually, aims at informing the members of the Society, as well as the members of the School Committee about a variety of topics and issues related to the field of Economics, for example how markets work, factors affecting the behaviour and decision making of economic agents as well as the importance of policymaking for the operation of economies. Last school year, a number of events were organised by our Society, including collection of non-perishable food items to help the Caritas Charity Cyprus, and the Annual lecture sponsored by Hellas Direct, with guest speakers the ex-Finance Minister Mr Harris Georgiades and Mr Michalis Antoniou Product Manager of Hellas Direct, both graduates of The English School.

Volunteering and offering to others and society, but also trying to understand the fundamental ways through which economics shapes our lives will always be central to the aims and activities of the Economics Society, one of the most interesting and active societies our school offers to its students.

Economics Olympiad Club

Year 6 - 7

The Economics Olympiad was first introduced on the 3rd of March 2019 by the "Pancyprian Association of Economics Teachers" and is funded by Deloitte. It is running parallel to the Accounting Olympiad, attracting a lot of attention and being warmly embraced by all schools, teachers and students around Cyprus. Last year's 2nd Economics Pancyprian Olympiad took place on the 8th of March, with two of our students being rewarded with the Silver Award. The aim of the club is to deepen the economic and financial literacy of high school students (A-level students), by preparing them to compete with other students on a similar educational level. The opportunity to compete against peers at a national level goes beyond being simply a support lesson and builds confidence and character.

Geography Olympiad iGEO

Year 6 - 7

The International Geography Olympiad (iGeo) is an annual competition for 16- to 19-year-old geography students from all over the world. Students chosen to represent their countries are some of the best, chosen from thousands of students who participate enthusiastically in their own National Geography Olympiads. iGeo tests the abilities of every participant in spatial patterns and processes. The iGeo consists of three parts: a written test, a multimedia test and a substantial fieldwork exercise requiring observation, leading to cartographic representation and geographical analysis. The programme also includes poster presentations by teams, cultural exchanges, and time for students to get to know their fellow students and explore the host city.

ECO Schools at The English School



ECO Schools is open to students of all years. This year, projects will take place in year group bubbles. Get involved and together we can make our school a greener place!

Eco-Schools is a fundamental initiative which encourages young people to engage in their environment by allowing them the opportunity to actively protect it. It starts in the classroom where it expands to the school and eventually the community at large.

Through this programme, young people experience a sense of achievement at being able to have a say in the environmental management policies of our school, steering them towards certification and the prestige of the Green Flag award following a three-year Action Plan.

It combines learning with hands-on experiences, the whole programme is run according to an all-inclusive, participatory approach involving students, teachers and the local community at large.

Eco-Schools challenges students to engage in tackling environmental problems at a level where they can see tangible results, spurring them to realise that they really can make a difference.

Projects and actions are discussed and run by an environmental committee including both students and teachers.

Junior Choir

The Junior Choir is open to all students in Years 1 – 3. Students are encouraged to join the choir and enjoy the experience of singing in a large enthusiastic group! A wide range of repertoire is covered, and students benefit through developing their singing technique, increasing their confidence, expanding their awareness of musical styles and exercising the brain. Singing has also been shown to improve students' sense of happiness and wellbeing. Extra care is taken of the boys' changing voices at this crucial stage in their development.

Senior Choir and 'Class Act' Chamber Choir

Years 4 - 5 Years 6 - 7

Senior Choir is an auditioned SATB group made up of students from years 4 - 7. The chamber group is selected from this group. We have performed a cappella in festivals and concerts at school, in Cyprus and internationally. Most recently the choir performed in Vienna, April 2019. Generally, tours abroad alternate with full musicals. The last one was "Grease 2020" - performed with live band, 15 years after our original Grease performance.

The Band provides an opportunity for students to develop their ensemble playing by performing a wide and varied repertoire and it provides a fun environment to rehearse and create music.

Maths Statistics Competition Image: Competition related to Statistics and Probability where students need to take 3 tests in order to qualify for the second round which is the data analysis part.





They work together with Science teachers and through group work, discussions, videos and presentations they learn and discover things about science. Usually we choose topics which are outside the syllabus. Everyone is welcome to join.

Astronomy Club

The English School Astronomy Club provides interesting activities and education in astronomy and related space sciences. We hold weekly meetings during break to plan events such as observation sessions, lectures, visits to scientific establishments, trips to dark sites and whole school events. To encourage enthusiasm in Biology through various activities, competitions and BMAT practice sessions.





F1 in Schools

Year 6

F1 in Schools is an international STEM (science, technology, engineering, mathematics) competition for school children (years 3-7), in which groups of 3–6 students have to design and manufacture a miniature car out of the official F1 Model Block using CAD/CAM design tools. The cars are powered by CO2 cartridges and are attached to a track by a nylon wire. They are timed from the moment they are launched to when they pass the finish line by a computer. The cars have to follow extensive regulations, in a similar fashion to Formula 1 (e.g. the wheels of the car must be in contact with the track at all times). The cars are raced on a 20m long track with two lanes, to allow two cars to be raced simultaneously. Software called F1 Virtual Wind Tunnel was designed specifically for the challenge. F1 Virtual Wind Tunnel or F1 VWT uses computational fluid dynamics (CFD) to simulate air resistance on the "cars" made in the CAD. The competition is currently operational in over 42 countries. The competition was first introduced in the UK in 1999. The competition's aim is to introduce younger people to engineering in a more fun environment. The competition is held annually, with National Finals usually in March of each year. The overall winners of the National Finals are invited to compete at the World Finals, which are held at a different location each year, usually held in conjunction with a Formula One Grand Prix.

FTC (FIRST Tech Challenge)

Years 4 - 5

The FIRST Tech Challenge (FTC) (formerly known as FIRST Vex Challenge) is a robotics competition for students in years 3-7 to compete head to head, by designing, building, and programming a robot to compete in an alliance format against other teams.





The Award is a personal development programme that presents challenges to young people in four main areas: Physical Recreation, Skills, Voluntary Service and Adventurous Journeys (and Residential Project only for the Gold Award). Participants work towards reaching the required standards in the above areas in order to achieve the Bronze. Silver and Gold Awards, Participants are supported by the school throughout the year so that they progress with their activities. In the process, they benefit by getting to know themselves better through developing their responsibility, initiative, self-organisation and teamwork. They can enjoy themselves whilst their experiences help shape their personalities. The Award can play a critical role in their personal development outside the classroom.

No activity can fall under more than one category. For example, even though there is not a significant physical component to archery, this is classified as a Physical Recreation activity for DofE. Therefore, it cannot be classified as a Skills activity, even though one might say that it is a Skills activity. Also, even though the general rule is that no activity can fall under more than one category, this also depends on the S.M.A.R.T. goal a participant will set. For example, learning how to play a musical instrument clearly falls under the Skills section, but with an appropriate S.M.A.R.T. goal, a more experienced music student can mentor/support a student who is only just starting to learn how to play a musical instrument and therefore this falls under the Voluntary Service section
